



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Priority Setting Partnerships

Examples of priority questions

- Which treatment is more effective for vitiligo: steroid creams/ointments or light therapy?
- Does appropriate provision of wheelchairs to enable independent mobility for very young children with neurodisability improve their self-efficacy?

Examples of priority questions

- What is the best way to care for people with dementia in a hospital setting when they have acute healthcare needs?
- What are the core palliative care services that should be provided no matter what the patients' diagnoses are?
- What approaches are effective for enabling parents, relations or carers to support physiotherapy treatment or to help patients to manage their own health problem?

2016 call for applications

Marie Curie, in partnership with Chief Scientist Office (CSO) and Motor Neurone Disease Association (MND Association), is spending up to £1.425 million this year through the Marie Curie Research Grants Scheme to fund high quality research.

This research aims to improve the quality of life of people with terminal illnesses and their carers, families and friends by addressing one or more of the research priorities identified by the Palliative and end of life care Priority Setting Partnership (PeolcPSP)

The application process consists of two stages - the outline application stage and the full application stage.

Sight Loss and Vision PSP – published May 2013

- Fight for Sight: over £11,000,000 awarded to over 180 projects
- NIHR: £2,000,000 for three clinical trial addressing priorities in cataract, glaucoma and keratoconus
- Macular Society: £700,000 grants for 12 projects
- 2 NIHR horizon scanning reports for new and emerging treatments (corneal disorders and inherited retinal diseases)
- Multi-charity partnership formed to address the top priority in AMD








Scope of the Occupational Therapy Priority Setting Partnership

- The type of evidence that's available and
- What's important to research funders.



Scope of the Adult Social Work PSP



- Social work defined in legislation
- Adults responsibility of the Department for Health and Social Care
- England Responsibility of the Department for Health and Social Care



Five Key Themes Within the Scope of the Physiotherapy PSP

Promoting patient and public partnerships

Developing and sharing models of good practice for reducing the burden on secondary care Putting physiotherapy at the heart of improving the health of the population

Supporting innovative, effective and sustainable healthcare

Promoting good practice in primary care for people with multiple morbidities



Two Cross-Cutting Themes Within the Scope of the Physiotherapy PSP



- Implementation Planning; and
- Demonstration of impact, outcome and value, including health informatics.

- Role: Oversee PSP and accountable for key decisions
- Who: Service users, carers and occupational therapists
- Members bring:
 - Knowledge of occupational therapy practice
 - Understanding of those using services
 - Access to networks and contacts
- Key responsibilities:
 - Contribute to each stage of the PSP
 - Listen to, respect and incorporate different perspectives
- **Time commitment:** Monthly teleconference (plus occasional all day face-to-face meetings) and work in between meetings
